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Dear Peekskill Families,

I am pleased to present the proposed 2024-2025 Educational Plan and Budget. As always, our planning goals continue to build upon the “Peekskill Promise”. I would like to thank the Peekskill Board of Education and our school community for their continued support as we add to our accomplishments at Peekskill City Schools.

This year has been a particularly exciting one for our school community! We have hosted a year of centennial celebrations, and had numerous athletic successes, including a football tournament championship and our first Boys Section 1 Gold Ball win since 2009! Last December, our community also overwhelmingly approved our next round of exciting capital improvement projects, which we look forward to beginning shortly.

In this newsletter, you will learn more about what the 2024-2025 Educational Plan and Budget supports. On May 21, residents will be asked to vote on two propositions- Proposition #1: The annual PCSD Budget, and Proposition #2: the establishment of the 2024 Capital Reserve for the purpose of performing Districtwide capital improvements. Our 2024-2025 budget will keep our tax levy at 2%, which is under the allowable tax cap of 2.18%. Our budget-to-budget increase is 6.35% this year. Our homeowner’s annual impact is \$69.08, or \$5.76 per month.

Next year at the elementary level, we look forward to adding a teacher at Oakside Elementary and eight special education aides throughout our schools to support our students’ needs.

At the secondary level, we are excited to introduce our new P-TECH and Smart Scholars grants, which will bring our high school students access to college and career opportunities. We will add additional staffing at both Peekskill Middle and High School, including a new music teacher at the High School to help expand our band, chorus and orchestra offerings.

In order to maintain and further upgrade our facilities, we have also budgeted \$500,000 to add new floors in classrooms at Woodside and Hillcrest elementary schools, as well as other abatement needs. Anyone who has seen our new corridors and hallways can testify as to the impact these improvements make in our schools’ atmosphere.

Programs such as our after-school initiatives and our Saturday Academy events continue to thrive thanks to grant funding. Our community partnerships remain strong as we add additional partners to help support our district’s goals.

Moving forward, we will continue to hold the five tenets of Peekskill's Promise as our guide for all that we do. Focusing on Pre-K to Grade 12 alignment, rigorous and culturally responsive education, while providing robust literacy and STEAM opportunities is paramount for the success of our scholars. Furthermore, we remain committed to nurturing the "whole child," while providing enrichment experiences and powerful community partnerships.

In closing, I encourage all registered voters to exercise your right to vote on the budget and in our School Board Election on Tuesday, May 21. Polls will be open from 7AM-9PM at Peekskill High School.

Me complace presentar la propuesta de Plan Educativo y Presupuesto 2024-2025. Como siempre, nuestros objetivos de planificación continúan basándose en la "Promesa Peekskill". Me gustaría agradecer a la Junta de Educación de Peekskill y a nuestra comunidad escolar por su continuo apoyo a medida que aumentamos nuestros logros en las escuelas de la ciudad de Peekskill.

¡Este año ha sido particularmente emocionante para nuestra comunidad escolar! Hemos sido anfitriones de un año de celebraciones del centenario y hemos tenido numerosos éxitos deportivos, incluido un campeonato de torneo de fútbol y nuestra primera victoria en el Balón de Oro de la Sección 1 Masculina desde 2009. Diciembre pasado, nuestra comunidad también aprobó abrumadoramente nuestra próxima ronda de emocionantes proyectos de mejoras de capital, que esperamos comenzar en breve.

En este boletín, usted aprenderá más sobre lo que apoya el Plan Educativo 2024-2025 y el Presupuesto. El 21 de mayo, se pedirá a los residentes que voten sobre dos proposiciones: La Proposición #1: El Presupuesto Anual de PCSD, y la Proposición #2: El Establecimiento de la Reserva de Capital 2024 con el propósito de realizar mejoras de capital en todo el Distrito. Nuestro presupuesto de 2024-2025 mantendrá nuestra tasa fiscal en el 2%, que está bajo el límite impositivo permisible del 2.18%. Nuestro aumento de presupuesto a presupuesto es de 6.35% este año. El impacto anual de nuestros propietarios es de \$69.08, o \$5.76 por mes.

El próximo año, en el nivel de primaria, esperamos agregar un maestro en la Escuela Primaria Oakside y ocho asistentes de educación especial en todas nuestras escuelas para apoyar las necesidades de nuestros estudiantes.

En el nivel secundario, estamos emocionados de presentar nuestras nuevas becas P-TECH y Smart Scholars, que brindarán a nuestros estudiantes de secundaria acceso a la universidad y oportunidades de carrera. Agregaremos personal adicional en Peekskill Middle y High School, incluyendo un nuevo profesor de música en la High School para ayudar a expandir nuestra oferta de banda, coro y orquesta.

Con el fin de mantener y mejorar aún más nuestras instalaciones, también hemos presupuestado \$500,000 para agregar nuevos pisos en las aulas de las escuelas primarias Woodside y Hillcrest, así como otras necesidades de reducción. Cualquiera que haya visto nuestros nuevos pasillos y corredores puede testificar sobre el impacto que tienen en la atmósfera de nuestras escuelas.

Programas como nuestras iniciativas extracurriculares y nuestros eventos de la Academia de los Sábados continúan prosperando gracias a la financiación de subvenciones. Nuestras asociaciones comunitarias siguen siendo sólidas a medida que agregamos socios adicionales para ayudar a apoyar las metas de nuestro distrito.

En el futuro, continuaremos manteniendo los cinco principios de la Promesa de Peekskill como nuestra guía para todo lo que hacemos. Enfocarse en la alineación de Pre-K a Grado 12, una educación rigurosa y culturalmente receptiva, al mismo tiempo que brinda sólidas oportunidades de alfabetización y STEAM es primordial para el éxito de nuestros estudiantes. Además, seguimos comprometidos a nutrir al "niño en su totalidad", al tiempo que brindamos experiencias enriquecedoras y poderosas asociaciones comunitarias.

Para concluir, animo a todos los votantes registrados a ejercer su derecho a votar sobre el presupuesto y en nuestra elección de la Junta Escolar el martes 21 de mayo. Las urnas estarán abiertas de 7AM a 9PM en Peekskill High School.

EDUCATIONAL PLANNING

What does the 2024-2025 Educational Plan and Budget Support?

At the Elementary Level:

- ✚ The Elementary Enrichment program provides project-based learning experiences for all students in research, science, technology and the arts embedded in content area instruction. The STEAM enrichment program is offered in grades Pre-K thru 5 as an additional weekly course offering.
- ✚ The What I Need “WIN” period provides students grades Pre-K-5 with daily accelerated, as well as intervention instruction, specific to individual student needs. During the WIN period, literacy support is provided through a differentiated and tiered approach. In addition, accelerated students receive a daily opportunity to work in collaborative groups at a rigorous pace, with lessons focused around project based learning. All STEAM and enrichment opportunities align with the Peekskill Promise by providing differentiated learning opportunities at all levels.
- ✚ Literacy, Special Education and Math Coaches have been added to the elementary team to support instruction and the use of best practices. Coaches will support teachers with growing their expertise in explicit direct and specially designed instruction. The coaches will support higher level vocabulary, language acquisition, problem solving, project based learning and differentiated learning opportunities for all students.
- ✚ The Dual Language program is offered Pre-Kindergarten through Grade 5. This budget will continue to support the implementation of a Kindergarten to Grade 5 Dual Language literacy program. Our commitment to bilingualism, biliteracy, and the goal of the NYS Seal of Biliteracy for our graduates begins with our youngest learners.
- ✚ We have increased the amount of English as a New Language (ENL) staff in our elementary schools to support the growing population of English Language Learners in Grades K-5.
- ✚ The Elementary Strings program introduces violins, bass, and cellos, beginning at Grade 3. The Strings program will extend to Grade 12 this school year. The students perform annually in a recital or concert.

- ✚ Our portfolio of Social Emotional Learning (SEL) supports continues to grow. All elementary buildings have a dedicated clinical team that is well versed in providing overall emotional support to the “whole child” through school counseling and connecting with students.
- ✚ Continued expansion and commitment to the Community School Model, partnering with outside agencies to provide enrichment opportunities for our children.

At the Secondary Level:

- ✚ PKMS will add an ENL teacher based on the current enrollment of ELLs at the Middle School. The additional ENL teacher will provide the mandated services as per CR Part 154.
- ✚ PHS will expand the World language offerings by supporting an in person or virtual language teacher through an extended day program.
- ✚ PHS will expand music offerings in band, chorus and orchestra through an additional .4 Music teacher.
- ✚ PKMS/HS will continue an expansion and commitment to the Community School Model, partnering with outside agencies to provide enrichment opportunities for our children.
- ✚ A teacher will be assigned to the Family Resource Center (Bilingual- Spanish speaking) to provide program options and screen students enrolling in the school district. This is inclusive of:
 - TASC prep course (Formerly GED)
 - NYSITELL Language Assessment - This would expedite the registration, enrollment, and placement/scheduling of potential ELLs
 - English as a Second Language for adults

At the Operational Level:

- ✚ The District has budgeted \$500,000 to the inter-fund transfer to the capital fund for the flooring replacement and abatement at Woodside and Hillcrest elementary schools.

✚ The District awarded, through the formal request for proposal, a multi-year transportation contract to First Student, Inc. The estimated total by year of the agreement are 2024-25 - \$6,673,501, 2025-26 - \$7,505,169, 2026-27 - \$7,824,861, 2027-28 - \$8,070,057 and 2028-29 school year in the amount of \$8,349,235.

SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET: GLOSSARY

Below are a few definitions to help you understand the school budget process in New York State.

- **Bond:** Money borrowed to pay for school district expenditure. The money is often used for capital expenditures, such as the purchase of buses or the construction or renovation of a building. The goal in borrowing is to spread the cost out over a period of years, lessening the cost to taxpayers in any one year. By definition, a bond is a written promise to pay a specified sum of money, called the face value or principal amount, at a specified date in the future (the maturity date), together with periodic interest at a specified rate.
- **Budget:** A plan of financial operation expressing the estimates of proposed expenditures for a fiscal year and the proposed means of financing them.
- **Budget calendar:** The schedule of key dates that the board of education and administrators follow in the preparation, adoption and administration of the budget.
- **Capital outlay:** An expenditure that is generally more than \$20,000 and results in the ownership of assets intended for continued use over long periods of time. These can include new buildings or building renovations and additions; new school buses; as well as new equipment (e.g. desks, computers, etc.) and library books purchased for a new or expanded school building.
- **Consumer Price Index (CPI):** An index of prices used to measure the change in the cost of basic goods and services in comparison with a fixed base period. It is also called the cost-of-living index. However, the CPI does not take into account many of the items that cause school district budgets to rise, such as the increasing cost of health insurance, liability insurance and retirement contributions.
- **Employee benefits:** Amounts paid by the district on behalf of employees. These amounts are not included in the gross salary. They are fringe benefits, and while not paid directly to employees, are parts of the cost of operating the school district. Employee benefits include the district's cost for health insurance, dental insurance, life and disability insurance, unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, Medicare, retirement, Social Security and tuition reimbursement.
- **Expenditure:** Payment of cash or transfer of property or services for the purpose of acquiring an asset or service.

- **Fiscal Year:** A fiscal year is the accounting period on which a budget is based. The New York State fiscal year runs from April 1 through March 31. The fiscal year for all New York counties and towns and for most cities is the calendar year. School districts in the State operate on a July 1 through June 30th fiscal year.
- **Fund Balance:** A fund balance is created when the school district has money left over at the end of its fiscal year from either under spending the budget and/or taking in additional revenue. Part of the fund balance (called the assigned fund balance) may be applied as revenues to the district's following year budget. A portion (called the unassigned fund balance)—up to four percent of the total following year budget—may also be set aside to pay for emergencies or other unforeseen expenses.
- **Property Tax Cap:** The Property Tax Levy Cap was established under Chapter 97 of the Laws of 2011. New York's property tax cap law establishes a tax levy limit for each school district. The tax levy limit allows school districts to increase their property tax levy from one year to the next by 2 percent or the rate of inflation, whichever is less, based on a multi-step formula. School districts are then allowed to take certain exemptions that may boost their tax levy limits to more than 2 percent or the inflation rate. If a school district's proposed tax levy increase is within its limit, a simple majority of voters is needed for budget approval. If a school district's proposed tax levy increase exceeds the tax levy limit, a supermajority of voters – 60 percent or more – would be required for budget passage
- **Revenue:** Sources of income that finance the operation of the school district, including property taxes and State Aid, grants and other non-tax sources.
- **Salary:** The total amount paid to an individual, before deductions, for services rendered while on the payroll of the district.
- **Tax base:** Assessed value of local real estate that a school district may levy the property tax for yearly operational monies.
- **Tax levy:** Total amount to be raised by the school district after subtracting out all other revenues including State Aid. The tax levy is used to determine the tax rate for property owners in each of the cities, towns or villages that make up a school district.
- **Tax rate:** The amount of tax paid for each \$1,000 of assessed value of property. In districts that cover just one municipality, the tax rate is figured simply by dividing the total assessed property value by 1,000 and then dividing the result into the tax levy (the amount of money to be raised locally). In districts that include more than one municipality, the formula for

figuring the tax rate is more complicated. It involves assigning a share of the total tax levy to each municipality and applying equalization rates to take into account different assessment practices.

- **STAR:** The New York State School Tax Relief (STAR) program provides exemptions from school taxes for all owner-occupied, primary residents, regardless of income.
- **Supplies:** Consumable materials used in the operation of the school district including food, textbooks, paper, pencils, office supplies, custodial supplies, material used in maintenance activities and computer software.
- **Support services:** The personnel, activities, and programs that enhance instruction. These include attendance, guidance, and health programs; library personnel and services; special education support services; professional development programs; transportation; administration; buildings and grounds operations; and security.
- **Three-part budget:** School districts must, by law, divide their budgets into three components - administrative, capital and program - and each year they must show how much each portion has increased in relation to the whole budget. A further definition of the three components is as follows:


Administrative Budget Component: These expenditures include office and administrative costs; salaries and benefits for certified school administrators who spend 50 percent or more of their time performing supervisory duties; data processing; public information; legal fees; property insurance; and school board expenses.

Capital Budget Component: This covers all school bus purchases, debt service on buildings, and leasing expenditures; tax certiorari and court-ordered costs; and all facility costs, including salaries and benefits of the custodial staff; service contracts, maintenance supplies and equipment; and utilities.


Program Budget Component: This portion includes salaries and benefits of teachers and supervisors who spend the majority of their time teaching; instructional costs such as supplies, equipment and textbooks; co-curricular activities and interscholastic athletics; staff development; and transportation operating costs.


Budget by Object

GENERAL SUPPORT

These categories detail the expenses for the Board of Education, Central Administration, Finance and all functions covering Operations, Maintenance and Strategic Planning. They are expenses that are exclusive of the classroom and inclusive of the actual operational costs of the District.

Board of Education

The seven member Board of Education is elected by the community. The Board is the policy making body of the School District and operates according to guidelines set forth by the New York State Education Department Laws and Regulations; of the State of New York; and by the Board of Regents. Expenses for the Board include materials and supplies for operating Board of Education meetings, office expenses, and the Annual District Meeting and election costs. Costs for legal advertisement, attendance and travel to conferences as well as the salary for the District Clerk and election workers' salaries are also accounted for here.





ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN ELA (2022-23)





ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN ALGEBRA I (2022-23)





ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN GEOMETRY (2022-23)







ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN LIVING ENVIRONMENT (2022-23)





ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN PHYSICAL SETTING/EARTH SCIENCE (2022-23)





ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN PHYSICAL SETTING/CHEMISTRY (2022-23)





ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN PHYSICAL SETTING/PHYSICS (2022-23)





ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN U.S. HISTORY & GOVERNMENT (FRAMEWORK) (2022-23)









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PEEKSKILL CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT GRADUATION PATHWAYS DATA 2023

The Board of Regents approved regulations establishing multiple, comparably rigorous assessment pathways to graduation for all students. These regulations recognize the importance of engaging students' interests in rigorous and relevant academic programs in the Arts; Languages other than English (LOTE)/Biliteracy; Career and Technical Education (CTE); Humanities; Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM); Civic Readiness (CIVIC) and Career Developmental Occupational Studies (CDOS). The revised regulation allows students to use a passing score on an approved pathway assessment or successful completion of program requirements for the CDOS credential toward meeting the assessment requirements for graduation.
