Dear Peekskill Community Members,

I am pleased to present to you the proposed 2014-2015 Educational Plan and Budget. Our theme for the 2014-2015 school year is, "Moving from a System of Schools to a School System." In keeping with this theme, we will be implementing a new district organizational plan that places more attention on our students and their learning.

This year we have worked hard in procuring competitive grants to help offset general fund expenses. Going into the 2014-2015 school year, I am pleased to announce that our District has been awarded \$796,125 in competitive New York State Educational Grants enabling us to expand our Pre-K program and provide our staff with state of the profession professional development. Moreover, our State legislators heard our voice for additional state aid resulting in an increase of \$2.7 million. These resources, combined with the savings resulting from our Reorganization Plan, and \$900,000 in other reductions, have resulted in a modest budget-to-budget increase of I.86%, and a tax levy of I.56% which is under our tax levy limit.

This year we have seen some extraordinary achievements by our students. For example, out of 17 schools from across Westchester County that participated in this year's Business Skill Olympics, Peekskill's students came in first place, winning the competition's coveted Gold Cup. We also had numerous students from the PHS and PKMS Select Chorus and Select Band participate in the 2014 All County Chorus and Band performances at Purchase College which took place in March. Additionally, we are very proud of all of our Hillcrest Elementary and Peekskill Middle School students who participated in the statewide "You Be The Chemist" Competition. We congratulate PKMS seventh grader Nikia Carter for coming in second place out of 600 students at this competition. Finally, our sports teams are off to a great start this spring season and we are excited as our middle school's Environmental Club prepares to present their project on the Hudson River at the 2014 Wheelabrator Environmental Symposium in Florida.

I am confident that our District's goals and plans for the immediate and long-term future are ones that will result in additional successes. It has been said that when a group of people are committed to a goal, they can move mountains. With that said, I am looking forward to working with staff, parents, students and community members in being committed to providing a high quality educational program for each of our students.



In closing, I encourage you to exercise your right to vote on the Budget and School Board Election on Tuesday, May 20, 2014.

Proposed Budget

for 2014/15 school year: \$79,860,306

- This budget represents a 1.86% increase in spending from 2013-2014.
- The tax levy increase is 1.56%, from \$37,431,286 in 2013-14 to \$38,016,983 for 2014-15.
- The District will enjoy an increase of \$2.7 million in State Aid in 2014-2015 for a total of \$33,465,697. However, the Gap Elimination Adjustment will remain at over \$2 million for 2014-2015 for a cumulative five year state aid reduction of \$16.3 million.
- For an assessed value of \$10,000 the anticipated tax bill before the STAR exemption would be \$6,706.82.

PCSD: What inspires you?





Peekskill Schools Receive \$366,125 State Grant

The Peekskill City School District is one of forty-two school districts and charter schools and eight consortia to receive a New York State grant award for the Strengthening Teacher and Leader Effectiveness (STLE) 3 Program. The District has been awarded \$366,125 of the total \$24.2 million released by the NYS Education Department.



A large part of Peekskill's grant-funded professional development programs will focus on increasing student literacy.

Peekskill's most recent award came only weeks after the District received a grant from the NYS Education Department for their Peekskill Priority Pre-K Program (4P's Program). The 4P's program has received over \$118,000 for the remainder of the 2013-2014 school year and over \$310,000 for the program's following year.

"We are thrilled that our District has received this substantial award," said Peekskill Superintendent Dr. Larry Licopoli. "With this most recent grant, in addition to the money we received to fund our enhanced Pre-K program, our District will be able to quickly move toward our goal of maintaining a school system in which student learning is the main focus."

According to the grant's guidelines, the purpose of New York State's STLE 3 grant is to help school districts who have at least a 25 percent low-income student population to develop a "comprehensive approach to recruitment, development, support, retention and equitable distribution of effective teachers and school leaders as part of their implementation of an Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR) plan."

Peekskill's award will be used to support the District's Career Ladder and offer professional learning opportunities for faculty and administration with the goal of producing thoughtful, highly effective educators and leaders. These individuals will then mentor new and struggling professionals within the Peekskill school system.

"Through the support provided by the STLE 3 grant our District will be able to provide professional development assistance and support to our participating teachers and school leaders,"

said Peekskill Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction Dr. Joseph Mosey. "In turn, these individuals will bring their wealth of new knowledge back into our buildings to share with their colleagues, and ultimately, our students will be the ones who benefit."

A large part of Peekskill's grant-funded professional development programs will focus on increasing student literacy. All

participating teachers in grades Pre-K through eighth will be enrolled in either Early Literacy Training or the Literacy Collaborative Program at Lesley University, while participating secondary school teachers will receive professional development in Teaching Reading in the Content Areas (TRICA). Some will also receive bilingual extensions through other institutions.

In addition to focusing on the professional development of teachers and student literacy, grant funds will also be used to ensure Peekskill's building principals are prepared to help faculty improve their teaching skills. To accomplish this, participating principals will be trained with Teachscape Reflect, which is a complete observation and evaluation management system that will help Peekskill administration provide feedback to teachers.

"This is about supporting our educators and helping our students succeed," said State Education Commissioner John B. King, Jr. in a press release announcing the STLE 3 award recipients. "Districts across the state are already using the STLE grant to successfully develop and support effective educators. Research shows the best way to help students succeed is to have effective teachers and principals in every school building. The STLE grants are an important part of our implementation of the higher standards we've set for our students. The grants will help more students graduate from high school ready for college and careers."

The Peekskill City School District has indicated that they will sustain the programs brought in by the STLE 3 grant after the award period has expired. Those faculty members and administrators trained in the initial year during the award period will be certified to provide in-house training to co-workers in the following years, therefore the costs to the District will be minimal and will include only faculty/administer stipends and the Teachscape Reflect licensing fee. The District anticipates these costs will be offset by lower professional turnover rates, greater employee satisfaction and the reduction of additional professional development costs.

This past March the District began recruiting for the grant's newly created positions.

"We are looking forward to taking the next steps involved in enhancing our District," Licopoli said. "I believe the initiatives afforded to us by this grant will help ensure the improvement of our District's instructional practices while also reinforcing the District's culture of clear and high expectations for our students and staff."

\$500,000 for Capital Projects

Pending voter approval of this budget and SED approval of the projects, building aid is available for most of the projects targeted for the 2014-2015 school year including: HVAC upgrades, a replacement ceiling in Peekskill High School gym, repair and replacement of roofs at Woodside and Oakside Elementary, various bathroom and sink renovations, classroom upgrades and improvements to the technology infrastructure.

Peekskill City School District Announces District Reorganization Plan

At its meeting on February 25, 2014, the Peekskill Board of Education approved a plan to reorganize the District's Central Administration. The reorganization plan streamlines the Central Office by reducing two administrative positions and shifting responsibilities among three newly created Assistant Superintendent positions which are dedicated to the following areas: Elementary Education, Secondary Education and Administrative and Grant Services.

The Assistant Superintendents for Elementary and Secondary Education will work closely together and replace three positions: Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction, Assistant Superintendent for Pupil Personnel Services and Director of Educational Services.

The District is pleased to announce that Mrs. Mary Foster will be appointed to Assistant Superintendent for Elementary Education and Dr. David Fine will be appointed to the position of Assistant Superintendent for Secondary Education. Both Mrs. Foster and Dr. Fine's new positions will become effective July 1, 2014.

Moving forward, Mrs. Foster and Dr. Fine will be leading the District in fully implementing its Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment program, which will insure state of the profession programming for ELL, gifted programming, RTI, guidance, literacy, and student testing. In addition to leading Peekskill's CIA program, Mrs. Foster and Dr. Fine will cultivate a strong collaboration with principals, teacher leaders and staff as they all work together to reach the District's goals for improving student learning and achievement.

Having two central administrators responsible for curriculum and instruction will allow for a greater focus on student learning and for developing an educational plan that better promotes college and career readiness. The new organizational structure will foster consistency across all schools and improve accountability throughout the District.

"This shift is consistent with New York State's Regents Reform Agenda," said Peekskill Superintendent Dr. Larry Licopoli. "It will allow the District to quickly move toward meeting the Common Core Learning Standards and the new APPR requirements. It keeps

the focus where it should be - on student learning."

The positions of School Business Administrator and Director of Human Resources will be replaced by the position of Assistant Superintendent for Administrative and Grant Services. Dr. Joseph Mosey will be appointed to the position of Assistant Superintendent for Administrative Services effective July I, 2014. Dr. Mosey's new position will be closely aligned with the Assistant Superintendent for Business and Operations in carrying out financial planning and business office functions, while also focusing on all personnel functions, labor relations, grants, and security.

The Board of Education is also pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. David Fine to the position of Superintendent of Schools effective July 1, 2015. The Board's goal is to give Dr. Fine the time and opportunity to firmly establish the roles and responsibilities of the realigned Central Office, as well as the protocol for the District's Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment program. During the time leading up to July 1, 2015, Dr. Fine will work closely with Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Licopoli, to build this new organizational structure before taking over as Superintendent.

"The Board is very pleased that Dr. Fine has agreed to lay the foundation for the new position of Assistant Superintendent for Secondary Education, as well as for a new Central Office design before taking over the helm as Superintendent," said Peekskill's Board of Education President Doug Glickert upon Dr. Fine's appointment. "We believe that Dr. Fine's appointment answers the public's concern that we recruit a proven and well respected educator and leader who fully understands and appreciates the Peekskill community and school district. Dr. Fine is an instructional leader with a demonstrated and known successful tenure at Peekskill. He understands the District's strengths and challenges and is committed to our children and school community. We are confident that he will capably lead Peekskill to ensure our students have the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in the 21st Century."

Community members who were present at the February 25 meeting spoke out in favor of the District's recommendations.

Fine, Foster and Mosey, who were also in attendance at the meeting, each stated their gratitude to the Board for their appointments. Additionally, each expressed their excitement for the opportunity to lead Peekskill's faculty and students going forward.




