Dear Peekskill Community Members,

I am pleased to present to you the proposed 2018 - 2019 Educational Plan and Budget. Our planning goals for next school year continue to build upon our new mission statement of "empowering all students to strive for excellence as lifelong learners who embrace diversity and are contributing members of a global society." The proposed Educational Plan and Budget has factored in projected enrollment increases and will add value to our District by improving our K-12 program development and in addressing needed capital improvements in our buildings. Our proposed budget increase of 3.74% is supported by a state aid increase of 3.87% that will keep our tax levy at 2.14%, which is tax cap compliant.

At the elementary level, we are continuing the development of "community schools," where each school building serves as a beacon for family and community engagement. Academically, we will continue to enhance our projectbased learning experiences for all students in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics (STEAM). The Elementary Enrichment program is a Grade 2-5 STEAM focus.

As we strive for a 100% graduation rate, the Peekskill City School District will be adding supports to our secondary level in a variety of positions. We will be adding an additional Assistant Principal to the high school to assist with day to day building management and instructional oversight. In our middle school, we will be adding a part time music teacher to our Strings program. The Strings program has grown the past three years in Grades 3-5 and we will proudly extend the program into our middle school, realizing our dream of a full orchestra over time. We have recommended the expansion of Peekskill High School's electives to include an additional teacher in Art and Business. Our goal in Art is to develop classes in digital and graphic arts creating a sequence of classes to add to our already rich Art program. Our Business program will introduce our students to accounting, business law, marketing and management. In addition, our Robotics and Broadband Academy will see additional sections added. All of these courses will enrich our students' learning experiences and better serve them in terms of their post high school college and career plans.

Finally, in order to upgrade our facilities we have budgeted \$350,000 to address needed work. Upgrades will include doors and hardware, brick repointing and sidewalk/asphalt repair at Oakside Elementary School as well as gym painting,



pad replacement and sidewalk repair at Woodside Elementary School.

In closing, I ask that you review the Educational Plan and Budget for the details of our initiatives and I encourage you to exercise your right to vote on the Budget and in our School Board Election on Tuesday, May 15, 2018.

School Board Election

Two, three-year seats are up for election: Incumbent Lisa Aspinall-Kellawon and one vacant seat. Voters will select two members to the Peekskill City School District Board of Education.

All Individuals Must Be Qualified to Vote: A qualified voter is a person who is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old, and a resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the vote.

When and Where to Vote: The vote on the annual budget and for school board candidates will take place on Tuesday, May 15, 2018 from 7 A.M. to 9 P.M. To vote you must be registered for either the school elections or general elections. Voting will take place at Peekskill High School, 1072 Elm Street.

Absentee Ballots: The Board of Education provides for absentee ballots for the election of members of the Board of Education, the adoption of the annual budget, and propositions. Applications for absentee ballots are available in the office of the District Clerk, 1031 Elm Street, between the hours of 8 A.M. and 4 P.M.

Absentee ballots will be available in the office of the District Clerk on April 27, 2018. Absentee ballot applications must be filled out and returned to the District Clerk by mail, or in person, by May 8, 2018. After an absentee ballot application is received by the District Clerk, an absentee ballot is mailed to your home. You are to return the absentee ballot in person to the District Clerk at the Administration Building by May 14, 2018 no later than 4 P.M. or by mail on May 15, 2018 no later than 5 P.M. What does the 2018-2019 Educational Plan and Budget Support?

At the Elementary Level:

Transition Classrooms: In 2018-2019, PCSD will continue to support Transition Classrooms in Grades I, providing literacy rich environments that offer a two-year opportunity for students to succeed academically. A new year-one class in Kindergarten will be created pending student identification and need. In this program, which heads into its fourth year in 2018-19, the classroom teacher "loops" with the same cohort of students. Students learn through play-based and project-based multi-disciplinary units of study. Acceleration will be individualized and movement to the next grade will be fluid. This unique program provides time for students to catch up academically, to keep moving forward each year, and eliminates the traditional retention model.

Enrichment for All: The Elementary Enrichment program continues to provide project-based learning experiences for all students in research, science, technology and the arts. The Enrichment for All program is STEAM focused and is offered in Grades 2-5.

Elementary Strings Program: The Elementary Strings program continues to flourish. The program, which introduces violins, bass and cellos beginning at Grade 3, heads into its fourth year in 2018-19. Students are added to the program each year as the third graders move to Grade 4 and 5. The Strings program will be entering into the middle school this year. The goal of a middle school orchestra and a high school orchestra will be realized over time. Strings students will continue to perform annually in a recital or concert.

Social and Emotional Support: In an effort to care for and nurture the "whole child," our Elementary buildings will continue to provide school counselor support and social/emotional services to our students.

Community Schools: We look forward to the expansion of the Community School Model. By partnering with local outside agencies, such as, but not limited to Arts10566, the Westchester Food Bank and Hudson River Health Care, together the Peekskill City School District and our community partners are able to provide increased enrichment opportunities for our children.

- Promotion of a Multilingual Ecology, celebrating diversity and recognizing multilingualism as a resource
- One cohesive Bilingual program Varios Idimos Un Corazón/ Many Languages One Heart. This program has a goal of bi-literacy in English and Spanish for students in Grades K-5.
- Increased parent education and involvement through our Changing Suburbs Institute Partnership with Manhattanville College
- Expansion of Community School Model
- Experiential Field Trips

- Growing Elementary Strings program. By 2020, our District will realize Orchestra and Marching Band Programs
- Technology Upgrades at the Elementary Level
- Replacement of computers consistent with technology replacement plan
- Increase of interactive White Boards at Hillcrest and Oakside Elementary
- Cromebook Carts, each equipped with 30 Chromebooks at each elementary building


At the Secondary Level:

21st Century Electives: Peekskill Middle School and High School will continue to add new and enriching courses for the 2018-2019 school year. New courses will be both informative and challenging for all students. New or enhanced courses will be offered in STEAM, Career and Technical Education, Math, Art, Business and Music. Peekskill High School will look to increase its sections in Robotics and Broadband Academy, while the Middle School will look at enhancing the Music Department by adding Orchestra for the first time.

Administrative Supervision at Peekskill High School:

We have increased the amount of staffing at the high school to account for the growing student population, as enrollment is currently at 1000 students and is projected to rise to 1040 by the 2018-2019 school year. We have a high needs student population, with 19% Special Education students, 13% ENL students and a large percentage of students that read below grade level. Because of this increase in staff, we require additional administrative management and instructional evaluation supervision. Additional administrative support will assist building leaders in the close instructional monitoring of our untenured teachers, while still allowing for the management of the day-to-day needs of our students. Our increase in staff will help maintain the solid foundations we have built several of our newer programs on, allowing for the continued development and success of these programs such as: the PHS Freshman Academy, the PHS Summit Academy, our Robotics program, our Science Research program and many more.

Instructional Supports at the High School: Peekskill High School will continue to look at ways to help support our students instructionally. We will look to add an additional Math teacher, two new Special Education teachers and increase class sections in Spanish. This new Math teacher will allow for a new block class in Algebra 1 for students who are identified as reading two grade levels below. In addition, adding a Math teacher will open up opportunities for all students to take four years of math, as opposed to the three years they currently take. Not only will the additional year of math help increase math and literacy skills, it will also help to insure our students are college ready. We will track data for 3-5 years on credit accumulation and assess how our students perform on the Algebra 1 Regents Exams. Our newly *Continued on page 4*

added Special Education teachers will focus on Regents level classes in Social Studies and Science for students with disabilities. Finally, additional Spanish classes will increase the opportunity for students to take level 4 and advanced placement classes in the subject.

New High School Electives and Sequences: The High School Art classes are crowded with a class size that averages 24. In order to further grow the Art program and allow students to have more opportunities in Art, we need to increase the amount of sections we have available. The enhancement to the program will be to develop a sequence of classes in graphic arts. In addition, we are excited to bring a Business Department back to PHS. Peekskill High School used to have a thriving Business Department prior to the 2007-2008 recession, when the department was cut. Business is still the largest field of study that students enter when they enroll in college. By reinstating this department, we would give students the opportunity to experience marketing, accounting, management, finance and many other business curriculum topics. The goal would be to develop a sequence of classes over the next three years while developing dual enrollment opportunities with a local college.

Bilingual Core Program at the Secondary Level: The Peekskill High School and Peekskill Middle School English as a New Language (ENL) program will continue to add to its offerings as we meet the needs of our student population and stay in compliance with New York State regulations. Both schools will add sections of bilingual Math, Science, and Social Studies into their core offerings. A "Program of Bilingual Education" means a program of instruction in which eligible children are placed until such time so they may attain a certain level of proficiency in English. Bilingual education is a method used to teach languageminority students in public schools. The concept is that teaching English Language Learners (ELLs) partially in their native language will enhance their understanding of the curriculum and help them succeed in an otherwise English-based environment. Once ELL students are fairly proficient in English, they can continue their education in classes with their English-speaking peers. A benefit of a Bilingual program is that it makes instructional use of both English and an eligible student's native language, while providing for the continuous increase in the use of English. Peekskill Middle School will see changes to its ENL program as we install new bilingual classes into the content courses in Grades 6-8. In addition, we will look to enhance the Newcomer experience by weaving art and music electives into these students' schedules.

Westchester Mediation: Westchester Mediation returns for a second year in 2018-2019 after a short hiatus due to a loss in grant funding in the 2016-17 school year. The Peekskill City School District will contract with Westchester Mediation for use of one of their counselors to assist with the social and emotional support of our students. Westchester Mediation has been instrumental in assisting with the needs of PHS' student population, and will continue to work throughout the school year to ensure a productive school climate and positive student relations. This added position will serve approximately 200+ students.

The Second Annual First Tech Challenge (FTC) Peekskill Robotics Tournament held at the school that day drew nearly 300 attendees and welcomed 19 teams from across the region, from Yonkers to Plattsburgh. Multiple work stations and "playing fields" filled the floor as students, parents, teachers, elected officials and PCSD administrators made their way around the room.

"The day was pretty amazing," said Peekskill Robotics Teacher Mr. Carlo Vidrini. "We received complements from each of the visiting teams and even the judges. Everyone I spoke to that came to the tournament at PHS all said they would be looking forward to returning to our school because this event has become one of the best in the region."

Both of Peekskill's Robotics teams participated in the day's events. The school's senior team, the Iron Devils, served as the hosts of the FTC event, and the school's junior team, the Mechanical Devils, spent the day competing.

"I'm really proud of the progress of our teams and the growth of our Tournament from 2017 to 2018 – it's been great and the atmosphere is fantastic," Vidrini said. "Everyone is ecstatic to be coming to Peekskill and we are very happy to welcome them. We're already looking forward to bringing competition back in 2019."

Peekskill Students Win at Westchester Science & Engineering Fair

Peekskill Science Research (PSR) students participated in the Westchester Science and Engineering Fair (WESEF) held on Saturday, March 17 at Sleepy Hollow High School. Students took part in the fair under the direction of Peekskill High School Science Research teacher Ms. Erum Hadi. Competing with close to 600 participants from across Westchester and Putnam counties, PSR participants won 4 awards in various categories and made Peekskill proud, once again.

PHS senior Jessie Zhanay became the first PHS student to place at the competitive WESEF. Her project titled, "Benthic Macroinvertebrates as Determinants of Freshwater Quality" won her second place and \$100 in the Environmental Science category. To place in this fair means that the student has achieved excellence (close to 100%) in their poster display and project presentation.

At the event, Zhanay also won the Stockholm Junior Water Prize for her unique contribution to the study of preserving water supplies. The Stockholm award instantly qualifies her to apply to the state level competition for this award.

Shawn Jimerson's project titled, "Cord Blood Transplantation for Patients with Malignant and Non-Malignant Diseases" won him the Greg Horace Award for the most creative and innovative approach in scientific research and a gift of \$50. Jimerson researched the use of stem cells retrieved from umbilical cord and placenta, which bypasses the use of ethically contested embryos.

Two more students also contributed to Peekskill's success at the fair. Robert Chacha and Nicolas Holman's team poster titled, "The Impact of Population Density on Microplastic Pollution Near Hudson River Shorelines" in the Environmental category, won the Stockholm Junior Water Prize for their unique contribution to the study of preserving our water supplies. The two students have also qualified to apply to the state level competition for this award.
