Summer is here again! Congratulations on reaching the end of the school year and gaining more knowledge about the world, your community, and yourself. Although summer is a time to rest and relax, it's also a great time to enjoy a good book. After all, learning never stops and our ability to read and enjoy stories is a skill that we constantly need to nurture.

With that in mind, over the summer you are required to read as many books as you can (*minimum of two* and get a parent/guardian to sign your log.) You must also complete one activity for one of the books that you read.

YOUR TASK:

- 1) Read <u>AS MANY</u> books as you can during the summer, (<u>minimum of two</u>).
- 2) Complete **ONE** activity in response to **one book** (your choice).
 - Create a Comic Strip: Create a 4-panel comic strip, being sure to depict a major scene from the novel read. Be sure to explain what's happening in the scene.
 - Create a Diary/Journal: Create a diary/journal for a character in the novel. Include the following: several entries explaining your character's feelings about the events and other characters in the book. Create a cover for the diary/journal.
 - Letter to the Author: Write a letter to the author of the book asking why the main character acted like she/he did or why the author developed a particular idea and thought it was important.
 - **You're the Author!**: You are the author. You have decided to write an additional chapter or change the ending of the book you just read.
 - Write a review! Tell a friend why she or he should read this book. Be sure to include important events from the story.
 - **Imagine!** Write about what would happen if you brought one of your characters to school or home for a day.
 - What **personality trait** of the main character strikes you as a good **characteristic** to develop within yourself? Why? Explain.
 - **o** Write a summary of the **plot** (story's events). Tell me what you enjoyed most. Explain.
 - Explain how a **character is acting** and why you think they're acting that way. Do you think the character is responding correctly to her/his situation?
 - Write a summary of the **plot** (story's events). How does one character's action affect other people in the story? Explain.
 - o Does a **character make a mistake** in the story? What would you have done differently if you were one of the main characters? Explain.
 - Complete a Fiction or Nonfiction Book Response based on the genre (type) of book you read! (See below.)

3) *EXTRA CREDIT:* Complete a second assignment from above with a second book.
