Native American Heritage Month, celebrated in November, was officially recognized in the United States in 1990 when President George H.W. Bush signed a joint congressional resolution designating November as "National American Indian Heritage Month"; this stemmed from early efforts by activists like Dr. Arthur C. Parker, a Seneca archaeologist, who pushed for a national day to honor Native Americans, leading to New York becoming the first state to recognize "American Indian Day" in 1916. Key points about the history of Native American Heritage Month:

### **Early Advocacy:**

Dr. Arthur C. Parker, a Seneca Native American, played a significant role in pushing for Native American recognition, particularly in New York state.

### **First State Recognition:**

New York became the first state to recognize "American Indian Day" in May 1916.

### **Federal Recognition:**

In 1990, Congress passed a joint resolution and President George H.W. Bush signed it, officially establishing November as "National American Indian Heritage Month".

#### **Reason for November:**

The month of November was chosen as it generally coincides with the end of the traditional harvest season, considered a time of celebration for many Native American tribes.




This theme highlights the importance of elevating *Native American and Alaska Native* voices, recognizing their commitment to service, and reflecting their perspective.











